
December 13, 2005, Stanley 'Tookie' Williams, co-founder of the Crips street organization, was executed by lethal injection after clemency and a four-week stay of execution were both rejected by Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger, amidst debate over the death penalty and whether Stanley 'Tookie' Williams" anti-gang advocacy in prison represented genuine atonement. After much support from the hip hop community, religious leaders, politicians and many others Stanley 'Tookie' Williams was the second inmate in California to be executed in 2005.
